

# North Stainley CE Primary School Pupil Premium Report 2016-17 Pupil Premium Strategy 2017-18

### **Introduction**

The pupil premium is a special funding initiative targeting additional funds to children vulnerable to underachievement through factors including -low income (free school meals FSM); looked after children (LAC) and children from service families (SC).

For the current academic year (2017-18) pupils who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years are also included in the allocation calculation. (This is known as the Ever 6 measure)

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium funding as they wish-but are held accountable and must report on how the funding has been used to support these groups of children. This information must be made available on line to ensure that all interested parties can see the attainment of pupils and be aware of how the funding is being spent. Parents of children in receipt of Pupil Premium are consulted as to the best way to spend it to ensure it has maximum impact on pupil outcomes.

Pupil Premium at North Stainley CE Primary School

At North Stainley CE Primary School we are aware that not all children who are eligible for Free School Meals are socially disadvantaged and also that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged will fall into one of the Pupil Premium groups. Therefore, we often allocate Pupil Premium funding to groups of pupils who will include some or all of the pupils eligible for the Pupil Premium but also other children who are vulnerable to under achievement. We consult with parents to ensure that the money is allocated to the area that will have most impact on a pupil's outcomes- socially, emotionally, academically or developing other skills- music, sport.

The funding will be used to raise the standard of achievement for children in receipt of Pupil Premium, including those of higher ability and monitor the impact of our actions in order to ensure that any difference between the outcomes of disadvantaged and non- disadvantaged pupils from similar starting points is diminished.
